Osgathorpe health check

- Nick Ashman, for donating the grass mower to the PC to maintain the Orchard Close open area.

- All the litter pickers who help to keep the village and surroundings lanes tidy, especially Dianne Caukwell who can be seen picking up other people's rubbish on a regular basis.

Osgathorpe Heritage Trail

It is the intention of the PC to develop a Heritage Trail around the village, highlighting a variety of points that are of historical interest, for example the former Wesleyan Methodist Chapel, the 25 evacuees that were housed in Osgathorpe during WW2, the site of the former blacksmith. Children's Play Area now open

Following an inspection from NWLDC, the PC has reopened the play area on Dawson's Road. Several signs placed around the play area provide compulsory advice on health and safety aspects. For example, it is your responsibility to wipe down/sanitise any

pieces of equipment both before and after use. Also, for the time being, please take any rubbish home with you rather than leaving in the bin provided. Cllr Jill Ella is undertaking a weekly inspection. When using the play area please respect the neighbouring houses.

Dog poo problem spreads

Aside from dog poo still on occasion being left on our streets, reports have been received by numerous villagers that some dog owners have been allowing their dogs to deposit in various farmer's fields. This is highly dangerous for any farmer placing pregnant cattle in these fields as dog mess can cause a cow to abort. The majority of our dog owners are responsible and pick up their pooch's poo, so thank you to them. It's only common decency to please bag your dogs' poo and put it in one of the bins provided around the village.

Snarrows Speeding

Several parishioners have mentioned that some individuals are still speeding down the Snarrows and that there have been some near misses both to cars and pedestrians. As we know, it is a narrow stretch of road with several blind bends. Please drive slowly and carefully down the Snarrows because the current situation by a few thoughtless individuals is literally an accident waiting to happen.

Neighbourhood Watch News

Kevin Legg, the lead person for the Osgathorpe NHW scheme reports there have been only 2 reported crimes during 2020, compared to 6 for the same period in 2019. The last reported burglary was in October 2019 and the last case of Anti-Social Behaviour was in June 2017. Sadly however, fly-tipping continues to be a problem in and around Osgathorpe.
