The Charnwood Forest Landscape Partnership Scheme (funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund) is hosting a series of free training sessions covering Charnwood Forest Wildlife Identification



and Recording. Each session is taking place online via Zoom but immediately

after each session is made available online for consumption in your own time.

Newly skilled 'attendees' are encouraged (optionally) to participate in the Charnwood Forest Species Identification and Recording Project, by recording and reporting your own findings. Osgathorpe Parish is at the perimeter of Charnwood Forest and so residents are invited to participate.

The Covid pandemic and the resulting lockdowns have resulted in an urgent need for food donations at our local foodbanks. You can donate to Shepshed Foodbank at any time by leaving non-perishable food in the Osgathorpe Church porch and it will be collected every two weeks. The Foodbank needs non-perishable items (tinned or dried food), toiletries (toothpaste, soap, shower gel, sanitary items, etc.), and pet food. Items should all be well within their sell-by date. As well as the fortnightly collections we plan to run another Reverse Advent Calendar this year in the run up to Christmas. More details will be circulated nearer the time.
