NWLDC Local Plan Consultation

Storey Arms Update

Following on from the refusal of the change of use application for the Storey Arms in October 2023, the Osgathorpe Community Pub group (OCPL) has supported the Parish Council in their application for renewal of the Asset of Community Value (ACV) designation for the pub (which had expired in November 2023). We received confirmation from the District Council, on 7th February 2024, that the Storey Arms ACV listing has been renewed.

The ACV listing means that the pub owner must notify the District Council when the pub is put up for sale and it provides a 6 month window where interested community groups can submit a bid to buy the pub. The ACV does not restrict the owner from selling to whoever they like, after the 6 months, but it does give the opportunity for the village to make a competitive bid. Importantly, the ACV listing also shows, to any other potential buyer, that retaining the Storey Arms as a pub is seen as a priority for both the village and District Council.

We are continuing to try to engage with the owner to buy the pub for the community.

To ensure clear representation and continued input from the Parish Council on the OCPL, Councillors Jim Elson and James Lowth have now formally joined Simon Blunt, Peter Hodgson, Dave Bull and myself on the OCPL management committee.

<u>The Future of the Church in Osgathorpe – Village Survey</u>

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) would like to thank everyone in the village who completed the 'Future of the Church in Osgathorpe' survey. As we stated in the survey letter, the church in Osgathorpe is at a crossroads, with a lot of work to do on the church building, but not enough people to manage it. The PCC is working with the Diocese of Leicester to explore ways forward, and the survey is the first step to get a better understanding of the value of the church to our community.

We delivered the survey to around 190 households and we were delighted to receive responses from 86 people.

Of these, 76 people said it was important to them to have a church in the village. This is incredibly encouraging and gives the PCC a clear mandate to ensure that, whatever options we consider, our priority should be to try to keep St Mary's open as a working church.

Villagers were asked how they wanted the church building to be used. 55 respondents said it was important for the church to be used for Sunday worship and 68 people said they wanted the church there for Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals.

One of the key findings from the survey is that, whilst there were a few people who thought that the Church should only be used for worship or Baptism, Weddings and Funerals, a large majority (75 people) felt that the Church should be a joint venue for worship and social events (16 people said they would be happy to have the church just for social events).

Each of the possible events that could be hosted in the church (and that we have hosted over the past 20 years) were wellsupported, with around 70 'votes' for each (concerts, films, coffee mornings/afternoon teas, meetings, etc.), and there were some very interesting suggestions for other activities that we could host. Many respondents highlighted that, if the church is used for wider community events, these need to be respectful of the church and the churchyard.

One of the PCC's main objectives for the survey was to assess whether anyone in the village would be prepared to help to address our resource problem.

29 people provided their contact details and said they were 'very likely' or 'somewhat likely' to volunteer their time. This is very encouraging and, once the PCC has decided our next steps, we will be bringing volunteers together to talk about how they can help.

The PCC will be meeting in early March to discuss the findings of the survey and, in conjunction with the Diocese of Leicester, we will then decide our next steps and put together a plan for how we move forward.

We will ensure village residents are kept up to date throughout this process, but thank you again for response and for your support.

Footpaths

During the Village Open Meeting held in the church in October there were many comments made about the state of the footpaths both in and around the village.

As a result of these concerns the Parish Council has sanctioned the formation of a 'Footpaths Group.' While the Group will not report to the Council, Andrew Dodgson, who is a member of the Parish Council, is joining the Group to ensure that the Council is updated on progress and can seek their support where necessary.

The three main aims of the Group are:

1) To tackle issues like the general accessibility and safety of rural footpaths in co-operation with local land owners.

2) To ensure the pavements in the village are safe and clear for villagers to walk on (think rotting leaves on Doctor's Hill!).

3) To investigate the feasibility of a footpath around the whole village to avoid people risking life and limb on the B_{5324} .

Thomas Harley's Estate Charity

Thomas Harley of Osgathorpe, who died in 1670, left in his will sufficient funds to build alms houses, a school and a school house, all in Osgathorpe, and land rentals to endow six clergy widows with £10 per annum each and £40 per annum for the headmaster of the school. In recent years the Trust has sold

most of its landholding and invested the money on the financial markets, which affords a greater annual income. 25% of this annual income is to support education with the balance earmarked for its 'Relief in Need Fund'.

The Harley Trust currently has a net income of approximately \pounds 240,000 per annum. In accordance with Thomas Harley's will, 75% of this income is distributed to the dependants of deceased clergy in the Diocese of Leicester and 25% to the education of young people under the age of twenty-five whose parents live in Leicestershire; the latter is notionally divided two-thirds to young people, with a preference for those who live in Osgathorpe, Belton and the old Urban District of Coalville, and one-third to the schools which serve these areas.

The Parish Council is keen to see funds from the Trust assist young people in their educational needs. To this end, anyone interested should contact Sue Stevenson who provides administrative support.
